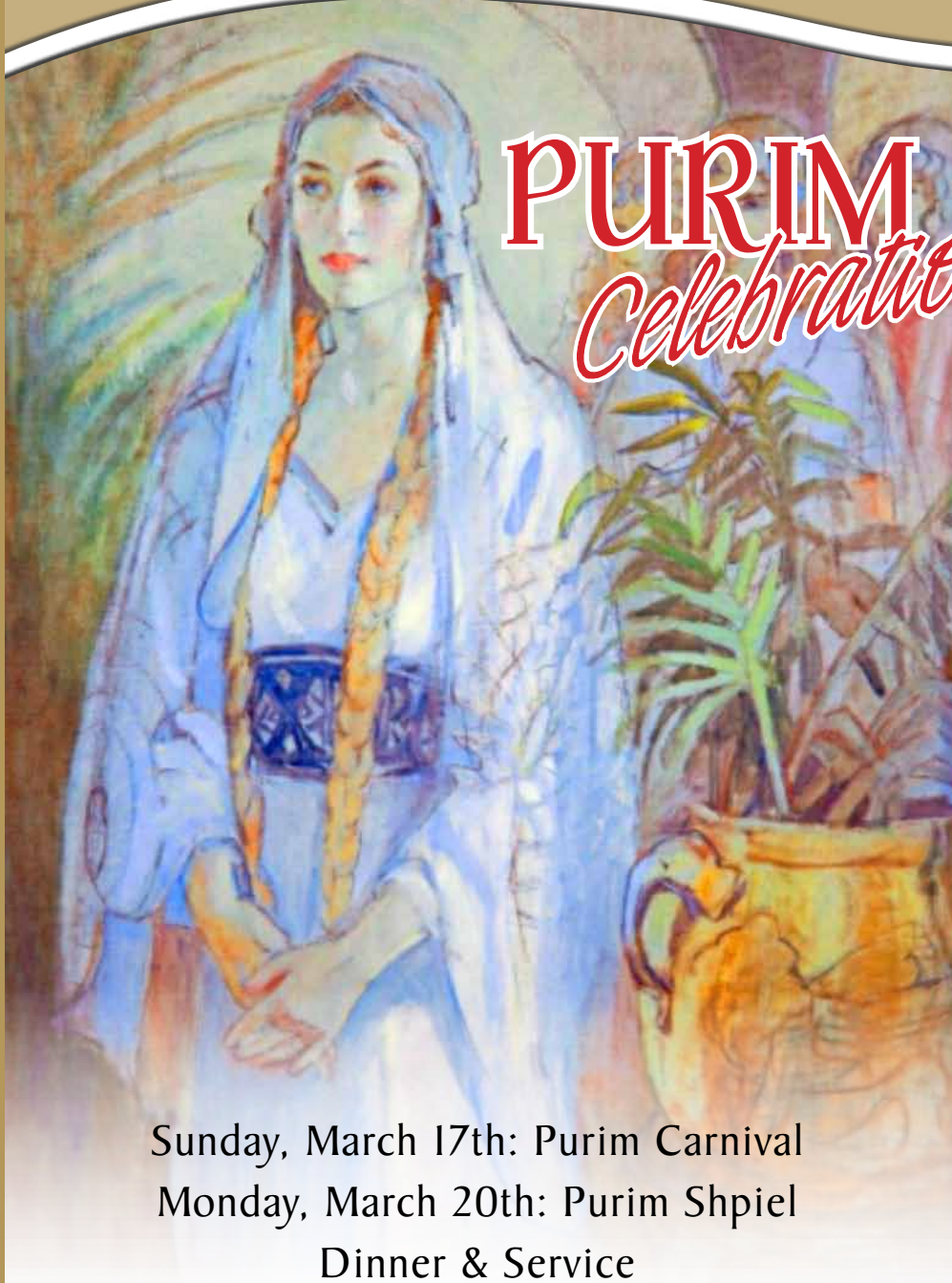

# Rabbi's Reflections

## Rabbi Paul Sidlofsky



### Chag Purim Sameach!

What is unusual about the book of Esther, that we will soon read on Purim? It is the only book in the Bible that does not mention God. It is hard to believe that a book of the Holy Bible does not mention the Holy One. In fact, later additions intentionally were made to versions of the book of Esther that primarily emphasized God's role in the story of the Jews' rescue from annihilation. It was such a blatant omission, the author's thought, that they went overboard to show their belief that God was always involved, though not initially mentioned.

Whether or not God played a direct role in the events – or, for that matter, whether or not the events have any historical basis – the debate raises some important questions which pertain to our Jewish beliefs and practices today.

Often I hear from people that they have avoided joining a congregation because they are not religious. I have two responses to that. First, being religious is not what we often think it is. Many think the definition of “religious” is being extremely traditional when it comes to ritual practice. Actually, it has to do with one's perspective on life itself. Regardless of level of observance, being religious means having a sense of awe and wonder regarding the world. It is something we admire in children, that we often lose as adults. Nonetheless, I think most, if not all, adults have the capacity to appreciate the world from a spiritual, religious perspective, and thus benefit from the joy, gratitude and humility that ensues.

Second, even if we accept the traditional definition of “religious”, the fact is that many people do not join a congregation because of ritual involvement. I am not saying that this aspect of Temple life isn't important.

Yet for many, there are other needs that are greater. Thankfully, at Temple Isaiah, there are multiple entryways into Jewish life. Some may enjoy services; others are inspired through education, social interaction, community service, interfaith activities, cultural offerings like music, art and food, and, of course, a feeling of belonging. There are other valid reasons for joining as well.

All this is to say, whether in the Purim story or in the complexities of life today, that we as Jews can and should affiliate for various reasons. Yes, a Temple needs to offer traditional elements, but we also need to realize that not everyone will need each aspect – and they may need others. Similarly, we all bring different views of God's role – or perceived lack of role – in our lives and in the lives of Jews and humanity. Whatever our perspective, however, we have a place in our community and an important role to play, with thoughts and skills to contribute. This is what makes a Reform congregation – and Temple Isaiah in particular – so special. We combine respect for tradition with openness to change and new ideas, thereby creating a beautiful mosaic which continues to attract and welcome all who join or visit us. May we remain truly blessed by the variety and beauty in our community.

Wendy, Ben and I wish you a *Chag Purim Sameach* – a joyous Purim! Come celebrate with us at our Religious School Purim Carnival (all are welcome!) at 9 AM on Sunday, March 17th and at our Purim dinner, *Megillah* reading and play, beginning at 6:15 PM on Wednesday, March 20th. Costumes are encouraged for all ages at both events!

# A Note from Cantor-Education Director Marcey Wagner



## Developing a Courageous Connection with Israel

I recently returned from an educator's trip to Israel. I spent 8 days touring various sites with 16 Jewish educators from the New York area, one logistic/guard person, 2 educator-leaders from the Jewish Agency in Israel and a facilitator from the Jewish Education Project. The goals of the trip were to 'experience communicable aspects of Israel's complexity that can be viewed through an educational framework; and to lay seeds of Israel educators – teaching new lessons and in new directions.' Lofty goals indeed, and ones that I think were accomplished by our hectic, and unique itinerary. We were exposed to a diverse cross-section of Israel's population through site visits, lectures, performances and reading materials. We de-briefed as a group each morning and night – trying to make sense of the vast amounts of information we were taking in and trying to process it in ways that would best serve our home congregations.

We went to the desert to visit the grave of David Ben Gurion, the first prime minister of the state of Israel and a prime figure in the founding of the state. As I took in the beauty of the Negev landscape, I could truly imagine Abraham and Sarah wandering these same hills with their flocks of sheep. Ben Gurion loved the desert and felt very at home there and attached to the land. He even returned to his desert kibbutz at age 53 to work in the fields side by side with 20-year-olds.

In this spot, symbols of Israel's 2 vastly different beginnings were laid out side by side. The landscape of the Bible formed the backdrop, where our deep connection to God began and developed, while the revered burial site of David Ben Gurion formed the

foreground – a secularist, dedicated to the rebirth of a distinctly Jewish nation able to determine its own destiny. This duality of purpose and vision repeated itself throughout our trip. Sometimes they converged in harmony, other times, they bitterly clashed.

One day of 'clashing' occurred when we visited East Jerusalem, the neighborhoods that were controlled by Jordan prior to 1967. We took a walking tour and then stopped in a modern book store owned and run by 2 generations of Palestinian Jerusalemites. We were addressed by the son and now co-owner Mahmoud. He eloquently described the day to day life of a Palestinian living in what he called 'occupied' land. He was passionate and articulate, and his message was quite powerful. It gave many of us a great deal to think about. We immediately boarded our bus and travelled north to the ancient site of Shiloh.

Shiloh is located in the West Bank. It is a part of that area not controlled by the Palestinian authority, but under the control of the military. On our way, we passed the security barrier dividing areas populated by Palestinians from those populated by Jewish Israelis. We passed through a check point and drove by a refugee camp. We pondered the complex issues of security, freedom and land ownership.

Shiloh is part of a large site run by religious Jews who have settled in various towns and villages in the surrounding hills. Biblical Shiloh was the place where the Israelites placed the Tabernacle once they entered the

land of Israel. After moving in the desert with Moses and the Israelites, the tabernacle stayed in Shiloh for 350 years until the Temple was built in Jerusalem. Then, all the holy items within the tabernacle were moved to Solomon's Temple.

Shiloh is now an archeological site where they believe they have discovered the actual spot where the tabernacle stood. This is the spot where Hannah wept her tears when she was childless. This is where Eli the priest promised her she would have a child. (We read this story as part of the Haftarah every Rosh Hashana.) We were given a tour and talk by 2 very impassioned residents of the area. They are deeply connected to the land and feel it a religious duty to protect it, preserve it and let thousands of Jews and Christians come and visit here.

Processing the day, many of us were frustrated, deeply sad, and feeling hopeless. Two sides, so deadlocked, so sure that they are morally right. They both have legitimate arguments, yet where is the solution? Will there ever be peace?

Perhaps the answer comes from an interview I conducted with a secular jewelry artist in Tel Aviv. Just before sitting down to a trendy burger and 'brew in a Gastropub, a colleague and I asked this artist a few questions about living in Israel today. She explained her belief that the situation between Israelis and Palestinians is extremely complex. Sometimes, she feels that both sides are talking in a different language and that we will never agree. However, she believes that both sides must never, never stop searching for a solution. Once we have given up hope of peace, we will give up our humanity.

I hope to continue to share my experiences with you and help our students and each other develop a 'courageous connection' with Israel.

# RITUAL COMMITTEE REPORT

## A Gathering of Holocaust Scrolls

On February 5th our Holocaust Scroll was carried in a procession of 75 Czech Torahs at Temple Emanuel in New York City. Alan Rosofsky carried our scroll in the procession and was accompanied to the event by Mort Rosen and Carol-Ann Gordon. All of these Torahs are actually owned by the Westminster Memorial Trust in London, England. They are on permanent loan to synagogues all over the U.S.A. and indeed all over the world. During World War II the Germans occupied Czechoslovakia and as the Jewish population was deported to the concentration camps, the Torah scrolls were stored in a warehouse. The plan was to put them in a museum dedicated to the Nazi conquest. During the 1950s they were brought to London and then sent out on permanent loan to Jewish congregations so that their stories could be kept alive.



Temple Isaiah is in continued contact with the Trust in London so when this event was announced the Ritual Committee decided to participate. We were instructed to wrap our scroll in a blanket for safe transportation. When we arrived at temple Emanuel it was amazing to see people walking down the street carrying their “babies”, the Holocaust scrolls, all wrapped in blankets. In the large ballroom the scrolls were placed on rows of display

tables. The very sight of the 75 scrolls all in one place was certainly impressive. The scrolls were then carried in procession through the ballroom filled with 800 people who then recited the Shehechianu prayer. Some of the Torahs were carried by aged Holocaust Survivors, but others were carried by proud Jews of all ages. When the scrolls were back on the display table we were addressed by the chair of the Westminster Trust who told the audience the history of the scrolls.



It was exciting to meet people from other congregations and share stories of our Holocaust Torahs. It is important that these scrolls are honored and used to tell future generations this important piece of Jewish history. At Temple Isaiah we have a framed letter from the Westminster Trust hanging on the wall near the front of the sanctuary. Over the years members of our congregation have contributed to the survival of this scroll and its story. Members contributed money to pay the cost of bringing it to our building. Members paid to have it restored to its Kosher status. A member created the mantle, the beautiful cover for the scroll. Alan Rosofsky compiled all of the information we have about the scroll and the town from which it came. That information is in a binder and is available to all of us in the temple office.

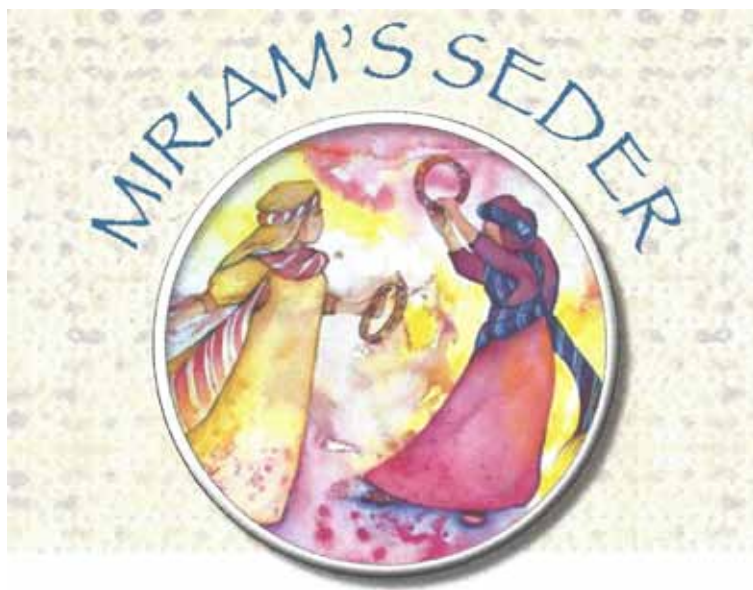

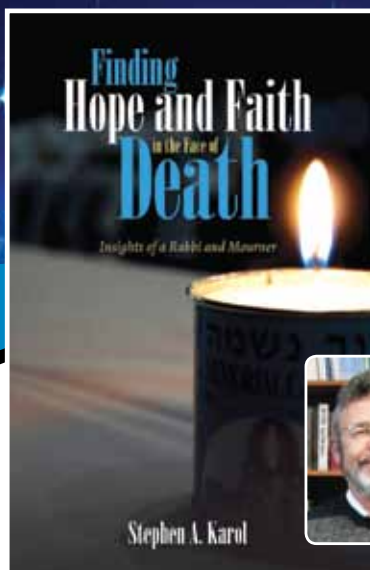

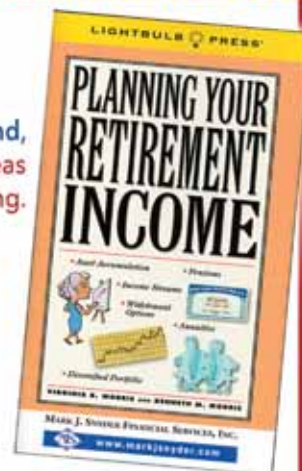
