This article was recently published in our local newspapers, but was not seen by a lot of our members. Its message is meant to extend beyond the holy day season, so I am sharing it again with you. May we continue at all times to actively pursue redemption for everyone.

From Parting Seas to Building Bridges

There is a story in Jewish tradition that tells of the Israelites' reaction upon leaving Egypt. Upon crossing the Sea of Reeds (Red Sea) to freedom, and seeing Pharaoh's soldiers and horses drowning, the Israelites broke out in joyful songs of praise to God.

In a sense, such a reaction is understandable. After all, we read in the book of Exodus that the Israelites had been subjected to forced labor by the Egyptians for four hundred and thirty years. Their lives had been made miserable by their taskmasters, and little hope remained for their redemption. So of course they would be ecstatic with this sudden turn of events. Who could blame them? The parable could have ended there, but it doesn't. We read further that while the Israelites were celebrating, God chastised them, saying, "My children are drowning, and you sing praises?!"

Could such a message be any stronger

or more meaningful? Could it contain a better reminder for us over three thousand years later, at this holy day season for so many, and a time of rebirth and renewal?

We are not so different from our ancestors millennia ago. We, too, rejoice in our achievements and successes, often disregarding their consequences and affect on others. We often delight — perhaps openly, perhaps secretly — in the failure of our "enemies", choosing to separate ourselves from them, rather than to build bridges of understanding and tolerance. Or, at least, we do not show any signs of support. We seem to forget that these people are God's children. We may forget that we are as well.

Passover, for Jews, is indeed a time of great rejoicing; a time to celebrate freedom and rebirth. Yet it is also a time for remembrance, a remembrance of the cost of such freedom for all involved; a reminder of the growing pains we have experienced.

At the seder, the festive meal of Passover, the story of the Exodus from Egypt is told with great ceremony and joy. And yet, during that time, we also reflect. Salt water is used to remember the tears of the Israelites during their time of bondage. Bitter herbs represent the physical and emotional pain experienced. And cups of wine, symbols of sweetness and joy, have ten drops

removed before drinking, in order to lessen our joy when recalling the ten plagues upon Egypt. In modern times, drops are also removed for different "plagues", such as war, disease, prejudice, pollution and crime.

If we are truly to understand the message of this festival for all people, we must broaden our perspective to look not only at our own good fortune, but also at the fortunes of others to whom we have a responsibility as human beings. We must reflect on our history — where we've come from — in order to truly appreciate where we are now. At the seder each year, Jews are reminded that in every generation, each person should look at oneself as if he or she personally had come out of Egypt. We are to see ourselves as experiencing the miracle of redemption; of safely crossing the Sea to dry land.

Now it is time to go a step further. Rather than relying on God's miracles, and then using them to escape from one another, let us create our own miracle — the miracle of building bridges to cross the raging seas of mistrust and prejudice that divide us. Many of God's children are still drowning, overwhelmed by the waters that engulf their lives. Only by working together can we save them. And only then will we have fully experienced redemption.




SIMCHAS & TZURES



Honoring Claire Baer on Her 100th Birthda

A BEAUTIFUL LIFE

Claire Baer was born to Ida and Jack Greenland in the Bronx on June 18, 1922. She grew up with her two older brothers not far from Yankee Stadium. In 1941 her family moved to Forest Hills, where she met her future husband, Paul Baer. After her mother had a dental visit with the young, handsome Dr. Baer, she insisted that her daughter needed to see him too! The two started dating and were part of a young professionals group at the Forest Hills Jewish Center, On Claire's birthday in 1950, the two were married and remained a happy and loving couple until Paul died shortly after their 62nd wedding anniversary.

Claire and Paul had one daughter, Ivy, who married her husband, Marc, at Temple Isaiah, with Rabbi Adam Fisher officiating.

Paul and Claire eventually left their native New York, living for a year in Tokyo while Paul was stationed at the Army Hospital during the Korean war. After several moves, including a year spent in California, they finally settled in Bethesda, Maryland, where Paul worked at the National Institutes of Health. In 1972 Paul accepted a position as the founding Chair of the Department of Periodontics at the Stony Brook Dental School, and the two New Yorkers were finally back in their home state.

Once settled on Long Island, one of the first things that Claire and Paul did was to join Temple Isaiah, where they remain members today. Temple Isaiah was small and inviting and they liked the people they met. Even now, as Claire approaches her 100th birthday, she enjoys attending Shabbat services whenever she can.

Claire has never been one to be guiet. She soon became known to the congregation, and to Rabbi Adam Fisher. He asked Claire to represent the congregation on the Three Village Interfaith Committee. Claire served on the Temple Board as Treasurer and as a Trustee. Those who worked alongside her encountered a woman with great intelligence, ideas, energy motivation.

Claire has always thought it was important to help Jewish youth connect to their religion and has been a proud supporter of the Joseph Karol Youth Scholarship Fund. She has given generously to many Temple Isaiah causes, and was especially excited to support the restoration of the Torah that was

saved during the Holocaust. Her daughter, son-in-law, granddaughters Leslie and Sara, and grandsonin-law joined her and the rest of the congregation when the Torah was dedicated.

Claire has visited Israel numerous times. One of her favorite trips was taken with Temple Isaiah when she was accompanied by her then teenage granddaughter, Leslie.

Looking for more avenues to aid the Jewish people and Jewish life, Claire decided to use her energy to support Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, and devoted her attention to Israel and the organization's research hospitals there. Claire is a founding member of the Sea-Port Chapter of Hadassah, served as President of its Suffolk Region, and was elected to the National Board. She has held numerous portfolios at Hadassah's National Office in Manhattan and used to describe herself as a "professional volunteer."

Claire's family, including her great grandson, Paul, will be joining her at Temple Isaiah as she celebrates her 100th birthday!

Social Action Actions

Barbara Meyer organized and helped the students do this project on the morning of the Purim celebration. Pam Kornhauser and her husband Sam made deliveries of Purim boxes to the homes of these congregants.

This was a wonderfully collaborative effort by our various committees. Our Parent Association, chaired by Ellen Covino, and The Caring Committee, led by Sue Rosenzweig, were supportive, enthusiastic and helpful. I'm hoping that our committees will continue to work together on future endeavors.

I am writing this article on the eve of our Passover Seder when we tell the story of how the Jewish people were liberated from slavery. As we relate the story during these fractious times, we think of the people today who are being harshly mistreated and killed by today's Pharoah. I pray that these innocent people, like the Jewish people throughout the centuries, will continue to persevere against all odds.
