Rabbi's Reflections

Rabbi Joshua Gray

A Good and Sweet New Year

Shalom Chaverim,

It has been an absolute joy for myself and my family to be welcomed so warmly to Temple Isaiah over the past couple of months. In such a short time, Meghan, Cameron, Lena and myself feel that we have found our true spiritual mishpacha (family). With much support and guidance from so many of you, we have, and we will, continue to do holy and beautiful things together. We now enter the High Holy Days as a community. These most impactful days on our Jewish calendar begin with what I like to refer to as a "spiritual warm-up," In the form of Selichot.

Selichot can be translated to mean "pardons," and consists of prayers wherein we begin to ask God to help us find the path to "*teshuvah*," which can be translated to mean "repentance," or perhaps more appropriately, "return." We begin on Saturday, September 9th with a wonderful Selichot Program that will allow us to get our feet wet with some of our High Holy Day liturgy and melodies. Before the Selichot service, we will watch a film and engage in lively discussion. I invite you to please join us on September 9th, even if you have never participated in Selichot before. This might be the year that you find a piece of Judaism that truly speaks to you.

We will begin B'Shaarei HaS'lichot (Entering Selichot) and many of our subsequent High Holy Day services with the words: "Hashiveinu Adonai eilecha v'nashuvah... Take us back. Adonai. Let us come back to You." These are the moments of the year when we set aside time to reevaluate and perhaps rekindle our relationship with the Divine. An entire year is so full of trials and tribulations, peaks and valleys, distractions and obligations. It can be difficult to wade through the pressures, expectations, and anxieties of daily living, and hear a Divine voice. God is always ready for us to return to a relationship with Holiness, and these Holy Days give us the time, space, and permission we sometimes need to put aside some of our earthly pressures and stressors, and truly return to a meaningful conversation with God. This dialogue will, in turn, strengthen our relationships with one another. We often pray together in the first person plural as if we are all speaking as individuals, but also as one voice.

As we clothe our Torahs in white. let us open ourselves up to peeling off some of the layers that keep us from experiencing the brightest of lights that are always nestled deep within our own souls. Our liturgy tells us, "Elohai neshamah shenatata bi t'horah hi... O God. the soul that You have placed within me is pure." Sometimes it can feel as if we have lost touch with that deepest aspect of ourselves. I invite you to experience our High Holy Days with joy and a sense of awe and wonder. If we can return to God, or perhaps even just strike up an initial "Hello, I am here", we empower ourselves to live each day throughout the entire year to its fullest potential.

I leave you with an invitation. I am here to serve you. If you need anything at all, even just a listening ear. Please do not hesitate to reach out to me at Temple.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

The Religious School year will soon be in full swing and our 7th graders will begin to answer the Bar/Bat Mitzvah year's overarching question - "Why are you doing this?"

And while their answers traditionally range from "My mother makes me," to "For the money I'll get in gifts at my party," to a stock "It's what you do when you're Jewish," I would like to expand the question to you, the parents and grandparents of our students and ask you the same question, "Why are you doing this?".

Are you at Temple Isaiah because you want to make sure your child develops and lives a Jewish life? Are you here because you want to be a member of Stony Brook's exciting and vibrant Reform Jewish community? Are you here because you believe that Jewish education should be a permanent part of your family's lifestyle? Or, like many Americans, do you view Religious School as a temporary activity you have signed your child up for like ballet, volleyball, soccer and piano lessons.

Regardless of your answer(s) to the above question, there are many things you can do to assist your child's Jewish education even if you don't speak, read, or write Hebrew or weren't born Jewish. First and foremost, you can actively support their studies while being a role model for their Jewish learning. Before I attended Religious School my father and my mother couldn't read a word of Hebrew, didn't know an alef from a *tav*, and only attended services on the High Holy Days. Once I began attending Hebrew School, my father, who worked six days and sometimes seven days a week, and my mother who was a typical homemaker of the 1950's, made the effort to attend an Adult Ed course to learn to read Hebrew. And although I grew up in Ozone Park a few blocks from the synagogue, my mother accompanied me to Shabbat and other Jewish holy day services for years, in order to teach me the significance my parents placed on my Jewish identity.

You can set the same positive example for your children. You can participate in temple programs together as a family. Attending Friday evening services after dinner teaches children volumes about the importance you place on their Jewishness. If you don't know how to read Hebrew you can learn it in Temple Isaiah's incredible Adult Ed program. You can study the ancient wisdom found in the Torah on Saturday with Rabbi Gray. You can join the Parent's Association and participate in their family fun programs and attend your child's class Family Ed programs. You can have Jewish books in your home to read to your children before saying the Shema with them before they go to bed. When driving you can even ask Alexa or Siri to play Jewish music and sing along.

Choose a favorite family charity or two and learn to give tzedakkah together as a family, not, as the popular adage goes, until it hurts, but rather give it until everyone in the family feels good.

There are many other mitzvot you can do with your children and I would be happy to discuss them with you. For now, however, I would like to end by giving you a challenge question I occasionally give to my students. "If ... mien landed their spaceship on your front lawn, how would they know that someone Jewish lived there?"

Chazak, chazak, v'nitchazayk.

BREAKING BREAD WITH BROTHERHOOD


The members of Brotherhood hope everyone enjoyed a great Summer.

THIS MONTH IN JEWISH HISTORY SEPTEMBER / OCTOBER



SEPTEMBER 5, 1736 (POLAND) A number of the leading Jews of Posen were imprisoned and tortured following a blood libel.

September 5, 1972 (Germany)

Black September, a Palestinian terrorist group, took eleven Israeli Olympians hostage during the summer Olympic Games. A botched German rescue attempt resulted in the murder of all eleven Israelis.

SEPTEMBER 7, 1827 (RUSSIA) The Russian government decreed the draft of Jewish boys at age 12.

September 13, 1993 (United States)

Yitzhak Rabin and Yassir Arafat sign the Oslo Acccords on the White House lawn. The Accords established the self-governing Palestinian Authority in the West Bank and Gaza. In return the PLO recognized the State of Israel.

September 26, 1348 (Rome)

Pope Clement VI issued a papal bull regarding the Black Death plague, *Quamvis Perfidiam*, which condemned the outbreak of violence by those who blamed the plague on the Jews.

October 17, 1483 (Spain)

Tomás de Torquemada was named Inquisidor General. He immediately established procedures for the Inquisition, seeking out crypto-Jews. His courts employed torture to extract confessions. Many were burned alive.

October 23, 1927 (Eretz Israel)

The Israeli city of Netanya was founded on the Sharon plain between Tel Aviv and Haifa. It was named after Nathan Straus, a prominent Jewish American philanthropist.

October 25, 1973 (Middle East)

The Yom Kippur War (October 6 - 25) ends. Following a surprise attack by its Arab neighbors, Israel defeated the combined forces of Egypt, Syria, and their allies.
