CANDLE LIGHTING

Traditional candle lighting time 6:17 PM

With the setting of this evening's sun, united with Jews of every place and time, we proclaim a new year of hope. God of the Universe, let Your light and Your truth come forth to lead us. These flames we kindle are a symbol of Your eternal flame; may they open our eyes to the good we must do, moving us to work for harmony and peace, and making the world bright with Your presence.

Light candles and then say:

Baruch Atah, Adonai, Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav, v'tzivanu l'hadlik ner shel (Shabbat v'shel) Yom Tov.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the universe, Who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the (Shabbat and) festival lights.

Shehecheyanu-Thanking God for allowing us to reach this day:

Baruch Atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, shehecheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higianu laz'man hazeh.

Praise to You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the universe, for giving us life, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this season.

Blessing of the children:

The parent faces the child/children and says:

May God bless you and guide you. Be strong for the truth, charitable in your words, just and loving in your deeds. A noble heritage has been entrusted to you. Guard it well.

May the Eternal bless you and keep you. May the Eternal look kindly upon you and be gracious to you. May the Eternal look kindly upon you and give you peace.

Special blessings for a sweet New Year!

Pick up a slice of apple, dip it in honey, and say:

Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha-olam, borei p'ri ha-eitz.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the Universe, Creator of the fruit of the tree.

Y'hi ratzon milfanecha, Adonai Eloheinu v'Elohei avoteinu v'imoteinu, shet'chadesh aleinu shanah tovah um'tukah.

May it be Your will, Eternal our God, that this be a good and sweet year for us.





Motzi

It is traditional to eat sweet, round Challah during these High Holy Days to symbolize wholeness and new beginnings.

Uncover the challah and say:

Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha-olam, hamotzi lechem min ha-aretz.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the Universe, Who brings forth bread from the earth.

Challah and honey: Your family also may want to enjoy challah dipped in honey. Some families include a pomegranate as a treat before the meal. It is said that the number of seeds in the pomegranate reflect the number of good deeds that you will do in the coming year.

Traditional candle lighting time 6:02 PM


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Light candles and then say:

Baruch Atah, Adonai, Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav, v'tzivanu l'hadlik ner shel (Shabbat v'shel) Yom Hakippurim.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the universe, Who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the (Shabbat and) Yom Kippur lights.

*NOTE: On Yom Kippur, we DO NOT make Kiddush at our pre-fast dinner. Once we say Kiddush, the holiday officially begins and then we would need to begin our fast and would be unable to eat our pre-fast meal.

TZEDAKAH

We now have the opportunity to fulfill the mitzvah of tzedakah—as generations of Jews have done before us—as the symbol of our desire on this Yom Kippur to try to learn to do good at all times during the year ahead.

May the words of our mouths and the works of our hands be acceptable to You, O God, and be of use and service to all. Amen.

IN THE SUKKAH

Sukkot Blessings

Blessing for Dwelling in the Sukkah:

It is a mitzvah to celebrate in the sukkah. While the Torah instructs us to live in the sukkah for seven days, many choose to only have meals in the sukkah.

When eating or reciting kiddush in the sukkah, recite this blessing:

Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu leisheiv basukkah.

Our praise to You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of all: You hallow us with Your mitzvot and command us to dwell in the sukkah.

Blessing for the Lulav:

The lulav is held up in the right hand, and the etrog is held pitom end (pointy side) down in the left hand. Facing east, recite the blessing. Turn the etrog up and shake the entire bundle three times in each of six directions: straight ahead, right, back, left, up, and down.

Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al n'tilat lulav.

Our praise to You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of all: Whose mitzvot teaches us holiness and Who instructs us to take up the lulav.

Shehecheyanu: Thanking God for allowing us to reach this day
The first time you wave the lulav each year, recite the blessing
marking a special occasion:

Baruch Atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, shehecheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higianu laz'man hazeh.

Praise to You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the universe, for giving us life, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this season.

Light candles and then say:

Baruch Atah, Adonai, Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav, v'tzivanu l'hadlik ner shel (Shabbat v'shel) Yom Tov.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the universe, Who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the (Shabbat and) festival lights.

Yom Kippur Options

We offer these options during the afternoon break, between 12:30 and 2:15 PM, for reflection, study, and prayer.

 Session 1: 12:30 – 1:15 PM in person or live stream Study Session with Rabbi Adam Fisher:

"The Amazing – Almost Magical – Power of the Kaddish" (in anticipation of the Yom Kippur Yizkor Service)

The prayer that is said for someone who has died never mentions death. Instead, it is a "doxology" – a praise of God that lists many of God's good qualities at a time when we may think that God is not being so good to us. The Mourner's Kaddish is a firm excression of faith that can sustain us after a death occurs and every year when we observe *yahrzeit*. Especially on Yom Kippur, it has great meaning for many of us. And – according to some sources from Jewish tradition – our reciting it can even "magically" help our deceased family members who are in the World-to-Come.

Tashlich

TASHLICH CEREMONY

By performing Tashlich, we signify our hope that God will overlook our failings during the past year and grant us favor in the year to come. We perform the Tashlich ceremony, seeking symbolically to "cast away" our accumulated sins and transgressions so that we may purify our hearts and our souls, as the new year begins.

Psalm 130

Let us cast away the sin of deception,

so that we will mislead no one in word or deed,

nor pretend to be what we are not.

Out of the depths I call to You;

God, hear my cry, heed my plea.

Be attentive to my prayers, to my sigh of supplication.

Who could endure, God, if You kept count of every sin?

But forgiveness is Yours: therefore we revere You.

Let us cast away the sin of vain ambition,

which prompts us to strive for goals

which bring neither true fulfillment

nor genuine contentment.

I wait for Adonai; my soul yearns.

Hopefully I await God's word.

I wait for Adonai more eagerly than watchmen wait for dawn.

Let us cast away the sin of stubbornness,

so that we will neither persists in foolish habits

nor fail to acknowledge our will to change.

Put your hope in Adonai, for God is generous with mercy.

Abundant is God's power to redeem;

May God redeem the people Israel from all sin.

Let us cast away the sin of envy,

so that we will neither be consumed by desire for what we lack nor grow unmindful of the blessings which are already ours.

TASHLICH

Let us cast away the sin of selfishness, which keeps us from enriching our lives through wider concerns and great sharing and from reaching out in love to other human beings.



Micah 7:18-20

Let us cast away the sin of indifference, so that we may be sensitive to the sufferings of others and responsive to the needs of people everywhere. Let us cast away the sin of pride and arrogance, so that we can worship God and serve God's purpose in humility and truth.

AvinuMalkeinu,

Who is a God like You, forgiving iniquity and pardoning the transgression of the remnant of Your people? You do not maintain anger forever but You delight in loving-kindness. You will again have compassion upon us, subduing our sins, casting all our sins into the depths of the sea. You will show faithfulness to Jacob and enduring love to Abraham, as You promised our fathers from days of old.

AvinuMalkeinu, she-ma ko-lei-nu

Eternal, our God, hear our prayer.

AvinuMalkeinu, we have sinned before you.

Eternal, our God, have mercy upon us and upon our children.

AvinuMalkeinu, inscribe us for blessing in the book of life.

Eternal, our God, grant unto us a year of happiness.

AvinuMalkeinu, be gracious and answer us, for we have not done enough good deeds. Please love us, be generous with us, and help us. Avinu Malkeinu chonenu va'aneinu kiein banu ma'asim. Asehimanu tzedakah vachesed v'hoshi'enu.

Rosh Hashana Folklore

FROM THE DEPTHS OF THE HEART

Many years ago a Jewish peasant boy who could not read and did not know how to pray watched as everyone traveled to town to celebrate Rosh Hashanah. The boy followed his father into the synagogue and asked him what he should do. The father told him to remain quiet and listen so that no one would know he was an ignorant shepherd.

The boy remained silent, but the spirit of the Lord illuminated his heart and he could not restrain himself. He began whistling the sweet song the shepherds sang to their flocks, the only way he knew to express his intense longing to commune with God. The congregation, startled, paused in their worship to stare at the boy in consternation.

The rabbi, in his great wisdom, understood the essence of the boy's heartfelt supplication. He called the youth to the bimah and blessed him.

"If only each of you summoned heaven with the sincerity of this child, the messiah would come today," he pronounced, "It is on account of the purity of this boy's simple prayer that the Gates of Heaven open to us and God rejoices."
